Dear Parents,

The newsletter is full of children's celebrations and achievements—thank you to everyone who has sent these in for the newsletter. Please keep sending them as we love to hear about what you're doing. Thank you also for all the emails after Wonky Donkey last week. We really enjoyed doing it new one this week—not slick but it is from the heart.

As we prepare for our reception children coming back on Monday staff are exploring ways to at least touch base with families of children who have not been given the opportunity to return to school. We are offering families of children in Y2, 3, 4 and 5 a chance to an informal chat with the class teacher. Families of children in that year group have been notified of booking arrangements. We have risk assessed these meetings carefully so it is as low risk as possible for you and the staff. Please do not attend if you have any COVID symptoms and we will ask you to sanitise or wash your hands before entering the school.

As you know staff are looking at video sessions for the children—again this will be for the year groups who have not been given the opportunity to return to school. This is a new initiative for our teachers and it takes a lot of preparing and training to get it up and running. High schools have been using this for a while but it is not so commonly used in primary schools. To begin with video sessions will be short as we all get used to a new, remote way of working—it will be 'creep and go' to begin with and evolve as time goes on hopefully.

Again for children who do not have the opportunity to spend a few weeks back in school, staff are looking at possibly inviting small groups in for a socially distanced, half hour session with their current teacher as well as their new teacher for September. These will be for pupils in Y2, 3, 4 and 5—it will be carefully risk assessed but will give staff and pupils a chance to re-connect, albeit for only 30 minutes and get ready for their next class.

Obviously all these things take time to plan and sort—we are sorry we cannot have all the children back but understand, like all schools, we cannot socially distance the whole school with the staff and space that we have. However because we are a split site, at least we can have the 3 classes back that the government have asked for as long as staffing levels stay as they are. I know a lot of schools cannot offer the Y6 a chance to return and many schools are not offering 5 days a week.

I hope you are keeping safe and well and thank you for all your messages of support—we know how challenging this time can be for families and we want to help if we can.


















Jack's Kentucky presentation



Monty's brilliant rainbow poem and his 'spotting fake news' work.





Helping prepare you and your child for their return to school

Tell them that school will be good, they will be welcome, looked after and they will be able to manage and do well.

Explain what might be different.

Remind them that there will be help if they forget what to do or need help.

Make sure they know what they need to take to school and practise getting this ready.

Allow them to talk about their feelings - what are they most looking forward to, is there anything worrying them, do they have any questions?

If they are travelling in a new way or it has been a while since they went to school then practise the journey.

Try to give some choice if possible so the child feels they have some control

Keep talking when they go back to school - check in at the end of each day

Stay calm and keep in touch with school if you have any queries - don't pass your worries onto your child

Don't be afraid to admit there are some things we don't know but everyone is acting in the way that we believe keeps them safe - their safety is the school's main concern
