
Booking forms for Goostrey All Stars are now available on the school website.

Victoria Cross Facts

The VC (<u>victoria cross</u>) was introduced on 29 January 1856 by Queen Victoria to <u>hoppur</u>, acts of <u>valuur</u>, during the Crimean War.

It has been awarded 1,358 times to 1,355 individual recipients. Only 15 medals, of which 11 were to members of the British Army and four were to members of the Australian Army, have been awarded since the second, world, war.

Medals are cast from gunmetal. The bronze from which all Victoria Crosses are made is supplied by the Central Ordnance Depot in <u>Dapoingtan</u>. This metal is cut from cannors captured from the Russians at Sebastopol during the Crimana War.

The cross is inscribed with the words, 'For Valous'. The medal was originally going to read 'For the Brave' until Queen Victoria suggested it be changed – as it implied that not every soldier was brave.

The first act of bravery ever to be rewarded with the Victoria Cross was by Irishman Charles Davis Lucas

Elizabeth Webber Harris is the only ever woman to be awarded the cross she got it during a cholera outbreak in India. She remains the only woman to be awarded a VC of any description.

The last living person to receive the Victoria Cross was L/CpJ Johnson Betaco, of the 1st Battalion the Princess of Wales's Royal Regiment, after he twice saved the lives of colleagues while under enemy fire in ten in 2010.

VICTORIA CROSS

The Victorian Cross is the top medal you can get given for bravery in the military .It is given to people in the defence forces who are brave in the face of the enemy. It is more important than any other medal it is awarded in the army navy or air force.

It is presented by a British monarch at Buckingham palace to either the person who has got the medal or to a family member if the person was killed for whatever reason. The Victoria <u>cross</u> started on the 29th of Jan 1856 by Queen Victoria during the Crimean War.

The medal has been awarded 1358 times to 1355 people. The metal is made from Russian cannons and is used for the medal. The ribbon is red for most medals except in the navy when they are blue.



Supporting parents as lockdown restrictions are lifted

The COVID-19 outbreak has significantly disrupted the lives of young people. The routines and boundaries for many young people will have been significantly altered due to the lockdown measures that have been in place. As lockdown measures are expected to be gradually lifted over the coming weeks and months it is possible that children and young people will wish to make the most of potential new freedoms.

Our Tips for Supporting Children

There are a number of things we would recommend as lockdown restrictions are lifted and young people have increased freedoms and changes in routine.

- Have a clear agreement with children about expectations when they are out
- Consider extending the curfews that have previously been in place
- Agreed to complete increased check ins when they are out
- Make sure you know who they are with and have contact numbers for them

A Message from Cheshire Police regarding Missing Children

The police are entitled to expect parents and carers to accept normal parenting responsibilities and undertake reasonable actions to try and establish the whereabouts of the individual. This includes:

- Make attempts to contact them
- Call friends or family
- Visiting areas they frequent
- Visit place known to be attending (for example friend's house or party)
- Checking to see if any items are missing from the home.

Once those enquiries have been completed, it may be appropriate to record the child as missing and take actions set out in national police guidance. Children who are breaching parental discipline should not be dealt with by police unless there are other risks.

Increased Risks during COVID-19 and Parent Resources

Young people are spending more time online during the COVID-19 outbreak as a means of staying in touch with friends, entertainment and for education. While the internet can be a positive tool to support young people during this period, they can be targeted by perpetrators and exploited. - The helpline is now the **first port of call for mental health help** it is operated by people in your local area who will know how best to support you. If you call NHS111 you may have to wait longer for help and will be re-directed to this local service so call 0300 303 3972;
- Please note, A&E and 999 are **not the best places** to get help for the majority of mental health problems **call 0300 303 3972** to be directed to the best local service to support you;
- You should still call 999 or go to A&E if you have an immediate, life-threatening emergency requiring mental or physical health assistance;
